County party fundraising for the first quarter of 2016 climbed at the fastest pace in several years even without a major state election this year, according to the latest reports filed with the Election Law Enforcement Commission (ELEC).

Thirty-eight of the 42 county parties reported raising \$1.5 million during the first three months of 2016. That was the most fund-raising since at least 2009. The 2009 total is slightly higher when adjusted for inflation.

County parties also reported \$2 million in cash reserves, the largest since 2010. Though fundraising is up, spending by county parties is at the lowest point in eight years.

Jeff Brindle, ELEC's Executive Director, said it is encouraging to see an uptick in party fundraising. But he said today's totals remain well below peak highs of the first decade of the 2000s.

"As recently as 2004, the combined county parties raised \$2.8 million for the first quarter. Even without adjusting for inflation, that is double the current quarter," he said.

Brindle said fundraising has become harder because county party officials now face tighter restrictions on contributions by public contractors and fund-raising competition from PACs and independent special interest groups.

He has recommended legislative changes that could boost party fund-raising while shifting funds away from independent committees to party committees, which he considers more accountable and transparent.

Those recommendations include consolidating the state's complex pay-to-play laws into a single, clear state law, raising the amount public contractors can contribute, boosting contribution limits for parties and candidates for the first time in several years, and requiring independent special interest groups to fully disclose their fundraising activities.

A comparison with 2012 totals shows that both parties raised more money than four years ago during the quarter. Democrats spent more; Republicans spent less than four years ago.

Both parties also boosted their cash reserves. Democrats raised and spent more money during the quarter and reported more cash-on-hand. Republicans reported a higher net worth, which is cash-on-hand adjusted for debts.

Among Democratic county committees that have filed their reports, Bergen, Essex, and Passaic Counties raised more than \$100,000 during the quarter. Bergen, Camden, Essex, Passaic and Union Counties reported cash-on-hand above \$100,000. Camden, Essex and Passaic Counties reported a net worth total above \$100,000, while Hudson County reported a negative net worth.
